Fort Worth Nonprofit Organization Receives More than 2,000 Wedding Dresses to be used for Angel Gowns
Program provides comfort, beautiful gown for final photos and for burial services

Fort Worth, Texas, April 1, 2014 – More than 30,000 infants will be able to receive Angel Gowns thanks to the generosity of those who donated more than 2,000 wedding dresses in the past week to NICU Helping Hands. NICU Helping Hands has seen an outpouring of love this week, including 250 volunteering to sew Angel Gowns. NICU Helping Hands volunteers turn donated wedding gowns into beautiful infant burial gowns. Hospitals in the Dallas/Fort Worth area benefit from this service, but other hospitals and families across the nation can request them as well. NICU Helping Hands will overnight a burial gown to any family in the United States in need. Twelve to 20 Angel Gowns can be made from each wedding dress.

"There's something hopeful about that start of life, about a wedding, and to me, it's that full circle," explained NICU Helping Hands Founder and President Lisa Grubbs. "This child who is so loved by their parents, being wrapped in love by a bride."

NICU Helping Hands supports families while they have children in the NICU, many of whom are born premature. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, about 11 percent of babies are born preterm each year, a group at higher risk for infant mortality. Over 24,000 infant deaths happened in 2013, the most recent CDC data indicates. Preterm birth is defined as prior to 37 weeks of pregnancy.

NICU Helping Hands believes that providing an Angel Gown for a family experiencing infant loss shows respect for the child and gives comfort to the families, a best practice that the organization will present this fall to medical professionals at a continuing education conference.

With increased awareness and funding, each year NICU Helping Hands could provide an Angel Gown for every infant loss in the United States. Shipping costs for 24,000 Angel Gowns are \$60,000 per year. Ten thousand donated wedding dresses can provide enough Angel Gowns to clothe infants in the United States for the next five years.

As the Angel Gowns story has grown, NICU Helping Hands has experienced an increase in online traffic from many wishing to share their story of infant loss or volunteer their time to honor a loved one. This week has seen over 35,000 unique visitors to the organization's website and 16,000 more Facebook likes. In the past week, NICU Helping Hands has reached over 26 million people via website and social media. As a result, NICU Helping Hands expects an increase in hospital and family requests for Angel Gowns.

"There's such a need and people want to talk about this," said Grubbs. "What they really need is love, comfort and validation that their child was important and existed because their loss has left a void in their life that is indescribable."
